Fly of the Month: Chironomids

Chironomids (Steve Saville's favorite fly), are the nymph (pupa) stage of large, lake-dwelling midges and represent one of the largest insect families on the planet. The sizes, colors and styles of chironomids can vary greatly, so be creative. RIO's "Ice Cream Cone" is a very good imitation of a midge pupae and often fished under an indicator in lakes. This will be a great pattern for the upcoming Lenice Lake trip. Join us in tying this pattern at Tower Lanes on Saturday, Feb 10.


