Members of PSFF and South Sound Fly-Fishers will be given this opportunity in Lacey on Saturday, April 13. They will be assessed by casting instructors and may choose to participate in the FFI Skills Develop-

Outings Rendezvous on the Yak

Friday-Sunday, April 5-7

Winter dreams spring to life as I contemplate our fast-approach-

ing outing to the Yakima River. As the water warms with sunnier days, it's showtime for the annual Skwala stonefly emergence. The bouncing and bobbing bugs tend to keep the trout looking up for an easy meal. It's also a time for great nymph action. Baetis or worm droppers combined off a Pat's Rubber Legs can be a killer combo. I also look forward to pulling out my trout spey and swinging leeches and small sculpin streamers through the feeding lanes

and into softer edges and seams. Blue-winged olives should be making an appearance as well, especially on cloudier days.

The fabulous Yak is Washington's only Blue Ribbon river. The flow should be low enough for good wading and high enough for smooth drifting. Although the Yak is known for its drift-boat an-

> gling, there is an abundance of walk 'n' wade access. If you're new to the river, let me know so we can arrange to meet and get you to one of my favorite spots.

> This will be our annual club rendezvous, after several years meeting up at Park Lake. The Yak is closer to home and Ellensburg offers more options. It's also one of our favorite choices for fishing moving water. We'll be camping at the BLM's Big Pines Campground in

the canyon, just downriver from Red's Fly Shop. No reservations needed (or possible) for our dates. First come, first served.

Or if you choose, stay in Ellensburg at the KOA Journey, a motel or Airbnb. There are also other BLM dry camps in the canyon at Umtanum, Lmuma Creek and Rosa.

The sad news: The Yakima River RV Park off Ringer Loop Road is now permanently closed. The glad news: The property was part of the sale to Western Rivers Conservancy, which turned it over to the Bureau of Land Management ... which makes it accessible to the public. It's part of the same purchase that was partially financed through a generous donation by PSFF.

Directions: Ellensburg is about two hours from Tower Lanes in Tacoma. The most popular spots along the lower Yakima for launching watercraft and wading access are Ellensburg KOA Journey, Irene Rinehart Riverfront Park, Ringer Loop Road and Bighorn Campground. Big

Pines, our rendezvous location, has a good takeout.

After speaking with Rob Anderson of Reno Fly-Fishing Outfitters at the recent Fly-Fishing Show in Bellevue, I got my fire re-stoked for a possible outing in the fall, soon after the lake reopens on Oct. 1. Rob loves that opener period when the weather is warmer, the big Pilot Peak strain of Lahonton cutthroat are hotter and angler competition is lighter. The big fish — which can often exceed 20 pounds are in greater numbers within reach in 20-30 feet of water. We'd be using light watercraft instead of the famous ladders. Fly-fishing Intro Class

This class will provide students all the basics of fly-fishing. Club members are conducting the course with facilities, administrative, and marketing support from PenMet Parks. Fly of the Month: Wooly Bugger



Woolly Buggers are tied in a wide variety of styles and colors to imitate a wide range of game fish prey in streams, rivers, ponds, and lakes. Its effectiveness is due to its resemblance to so many edible creatures in the water; nymphs, leeches,

salamanders, or even small sculpins. Its tail undulating behind a fiber, bubble-filled body is just too much for most fish to resist. Although the original Woolly Bugger pattern was believed to have been created by Pennsylvania fly-tyer Russell Blessing as early as 1967 to resemble a hellgrammite, or dobsonfly nymph, its precise origin is unknown, but is clearly an evolution of the Woolly Worm fly.

The Woolly Bugger is typically tied on a size 2 to 14 streamer hook and is constructed with a marabou tail (with or without flash), a chenille or fur body, and a hackle palmered from the tail to the head of the fly. Tying the pattern with a rib of fine copper wire helps protect the palmer hackle. The underbody may be weighted with lead or tungsten wire. Popular colors are olive, brown, and black for freshwater use. Brighter colors and combinations of colors are especially popular for steelhead, salmon and saltwater use.

Join us **Saturday, April 13, 9:30-11:30 a.m.** at Tower Lanes to tie the Wooly Bugger just in time for our club outing to Mayfield Lake.

2) Log in or sign up


