Memories

A scary experience happened on a recent outing while I was learning to spey cast. We were rafting an unfamiliar (to me) PNW river, when midway through the float, my seat, which overhung the rear of the raft, felt like it was coming loose. During an inspection on shore, the guide discovered that the seat (and me!) was ready to fall off the raft. Did I mention I don't swim? He quickly tightened everything down and we were on our way. Phew.

The next words from the guide were "we're going to experience some small rapids soon."

Did I mention I don't swim?? Those rapids were a bit more than "small" to me. I slid to the floor of the raft, clutching my life vest and muttering "I'm going to die." A minute later we

were on calm water with everyone saying "That wasn't so bad." Hah! Who knows the outcome if I hadn't mentioned my loose seat...

A close friend described one of her "most exciting experiences" on the water. Her friend had a fish on, but was struggling to bring it in, so he asked her to net it. The fish saw the net and twice, turned and ran. Almost falling in the river, she finally netted a large, wild steelhead weighing approximately 14 pounds. It was healthy, heavy, feisty, very strong and beautiful. The thrill for my friend was to take part in its catch and release. Excitement and the joy of fly-fishing comes in all forms: the sight of wild creatures you don't normally see, appreciation of your equipment or appropriate clothing, new and beautiful surroundings, the admiration of fish you stalk, catch and release, and the satisfaction that you're leaving a moment for another angler to experience. and what to use for fly fishing. According to my Yakima River guide friend, walking and wade fishing can be tough if the river flow is 1700 CFS and above. But it also depends where you are on the river (Cle Elum versus closer to Ellensburg). It is hard to predict what the flows will be, but April flows typically accommodate wade fishing in my experience. Check the flows before you head out and be safe!

If you have the opportunity to float with a guide, it really helps to learn the river, find fish and take in the beautiful scenery!

Fly Tying

The monthly fly-tying session is **Saturday**, **April 10 at 9:30 a.m.-11:30 a.m.** at Tower Lanes. Join us to tie an emerger pattern, designed to mimic the transition phase between nymphs and adults. Emerger patterns vary by insect, but are generally best fished near the surface, and can work well with drift, or as a dropper off a dry fly.



Tips for using emerger patterns:

- use intermediate line to test shallow depths in the water column
- emerging insects are often mildly active near the water surface or float in moving water
- Consider floatant or foam for buoyancy
