My Personal Journey to PSFF

Hello, my name is Tess Frazier. I'm the new president of Puget Sound Fly-Fishers for 2024. Let me to take you through a brief history of how I got here.

I was introduced to fly-fishing in 1994 by my future husband, David Frazier, the current PSFF Outings Chair. He took me on one of his club outings with San Jose Fly-Casters to fish for bass at Salt Valley Springs Reservoir in the Mother Lode country of Northern California. Having never fished in my life, he handed me a spinning rod with a bass lure on the end. He told me just "toss it out there and twitch it" as he busied himself prepping his fly rod. I did as instructed. On the second twitch I thought I was caught on a log. The line started moving and I yelled, "I think I've got a fish." That fish turned out to be a 5-pound bass — my first fish ever!

The next day I tried my hand at fly-fishing on the Stanislaus River. I remember this so clearly: My first cast, a Prince Nymph, promptly landed my very first Rainbow trout. I was hooked. To this day, the tug is still thrilling.

I quickly found that joining a club was the best way to learn to fly-fish. I learned about rigging a fly rod, casting, fly patterns, where to fish and how to fish. This was a time when women were scarce in fly-fishing clubs and I wasn't confident enough to ask too many questions about why I should do things a certain way. I found ease in talking to other women trying to learn the sport

I've now been a member of PSFF for seven years and served as Membership chair for three years and on the Board of Directors for two of those years.

My mid-life challenge was to learn fly-fishing. Thirty years later, I still might not be the best at casting or, for that matter, catching. But I love this sport and the respect it's taught me for all living things and the environment we share.

I'm proud to be part of an all-volunteer leadership team committed to serving the interests of Puget Sound Fly-Fishers. Our club has been active for an astounding 67 years. As the first woman president, I intend to offer some new ideas, a different perspective and more opportunities to enhance your fly-fishing knowledge and skills. I want to help PSFF continue to grow, strengthen its presence in the fly-fishing community while setting the example of an active conservation group.

Programs January Speaker

This months speaker is Mike Sturza, owner of Lost Creek Fly Shop and Mike Sturza's Fly-Fishing Guide Service in Onalaska WA.

Mike, a lifelong resident of Lewis County, started fly-fishing in the early 1980's with a single-handed rod for trout in the high country and swinging for summer steelhead in the lower rivers. Later he went to a two-handed rod in the Cowlitz for salmon, summer steelhead and winter steelhead.

In 1988 the Tiger Muskie were planted in Mayfield Lake and, as

he puts it, "that's when the Tiger Muskie addiction started". He describes having a 20" - 49" Muskie weighing up to 35 pounds eat the fly from your 11' fishing rod. I have to say that sounds like an exciting catch.
