On another note, one of the highlights of my term as President was the club's involvement with The Western Rivers Conservancy. Most will remember that last year we donated money for the purchase of the Yakima River Ranch. That sale provides 620 acres of prime river access for campers and fishermen. The Conservancy has been very busy, and the latest purchase is significant. The McLoughin Falls Ranch located on the Okanogan River has been permanently conserved. The ranch consists of 727 acres and will be co-managed by

the Department of Fish and Wildlife and the Confederated Tribes of the Colville Reservation. This piece of land will forever provide habitat for Sockeye Salmon, Steelhead, Canada lynx and Sharp-tailed grouse. The reservation will manage the northern portion while WDFW will manage the southern portion for conservation and public access.

Coming up mid-month is the yearly outing to Park Lake and later, Mineral Lake. If you haven't made plans yet, it's time. More information will be available at the May Meeting. Michael Paul Williams will be presenting a program on fishing for Carp. I am looking forward to that as I have always wanted to do some Carp fishing.

Outings David Frazier Spencer Lake Frenzy

Well, apparently, there was a trout derby on "opening day" at Spencer Lake. I use the quote marks because Spencer is a year-round fishery and shouldn't be a crowd magnet on the third Saturday of April. So they have a fishing derby instead. I have to say, the event did bring in a lot of families and boats. The parking lot was overflowing to the point where I had to offer my apologies to arriving PSFF members pulling trailers. I suggested they try either nearby Phillips Lake or land Lake. I'd like to hear how they did.



For those of us who met for the 8 a.m. breakfast at Spencer Lake Bar & Grill, our arrival to the boat launch at 9 a.m. was a bit of a shock. Some members had gone directly to the launch without the breakfast meet-up and found parking.

Those of us without a trailer were able to squeeze in our rigs.

Still, I sensed those who made it onto the water were having a good — if challenging — time. Not exactly the quieting experience I had hoped for.

Looking from the boat launch out to the water, I was reminded of the scene in "Jaws" when all the local fishing boats took off at once to win the big reward for catching the killer shark.

Given that the state had stocked about 10,000 catchables in the past month, plus whatever larger fish were introduced for the derby, the catch rate was remarkably low. Could the fish been put off by all the commotion from above? Do you think??

I ended up landing six trout in the 10 to 12-inch range and had about three others spit the hook. I had three flies that seemed to work at different times: my Trusty Rusty wet fly (size 12), orange Blob flies (thanks to Jim Baker for alerting me of its effectiveness) and my little Kush Mop (which substitutes a Kush Ball finger for the mop). I was on hand too, when Mario Maichel landed one using a balanced leech under an indicator.

Annual Park Lake Rendezvous

Friday-Sunday, May 19-21, Sun Village Resort

If there's only one club outing you can make this year, make sure it's this one. It has become a tradition of PSFF to gather here a laid-back few days of fly-fishing frolic. Among the attractions of fishing the **Sun Lakes region** — aside from the chemistry our club brings to it — is the variety of angling options close at hand.

Our gathering spot at Sun Village Resort is situated literally right between Park and Blue lakes. A 5-minute drive south on Highway 17 takes you to Lake Lenore, known for its population of Lahonton cutthroat trout (especially this time of year). A 25-minute drive south takes you to the famous Rocky Ford Spring Creek. The geologically awesome Dry Falls Lake is just 20 minutes north on 17.

Park Lake is in the heart of the Grand Coulee area of Eastern Washington, about 3 hours and 35 minutes from Tower Lanes, Tacoma. The lake covers 338 acres, reaches depths of 85 feet and supports mostly rainbow trout, but also has some brown trout, tiger trout and perch.

Bring along the usual flies for lakes: baitfish, leech and insect patterns; chironomid patterns under an indicator. Rods 4- to 6-weight; be prepared to fish a variety of water depths with floating, intermediate and full-sink

lines. Float tubes, pontoon boats, small boats, canoes or similar watercraft all work well.

Saturday evening potluck dinner: Bring your appetites and fish stories to trailer site 32 at 6 p.m., along with a side dish (salad, dessert, etc.), campfire chairs, firewood and beverage of choice. We will provide a spaghetti and meatballs entree. Plates and utensils will be included.

Location: Sun Village Resort, 33575 Park Lake Rd NE, Coulee City, WA, 18 minutes north of the City of Soap Lake along the east side of State Route 17. The resort has rustic cabins and sites for tents and RVs. Reserve your spot at sunvillageresort.com

Mineral Lake

Saturday, May 27, 9 a.m.

Fishing Mineral will be a first for me. According to Eric Apalategui of bestfishinginamerica.com, "Mineral Lake is generally considered one of the best lakes in Washington for trout fishing." Which also makes it very popular with anglers. It's said the boat launch can get busy.

The Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife's typically stocks 100,000 fry or fingerling rainbow trout each year, so I'm immediately thinking about tying on a Sparkle Minnow. There are usually more than 30,000 catchable rainbows planted — along with some jumbos — plus several thousand brown trout. In addition, expect to find resident Coastal Cutthroat and Largemouth bass.

At 277-acres, Mineral Lake sits at 1,770 feet elevation. On clear days, Mt. Rainier provides a scenic backdrop. Looking at a contour map, the drop-offs along the edges appear exceptionally steep, landing rather abruptly at vast areas from 25 to 38 feet. Drop-offs are great fish magnets. There are good amenities at the lake, including restrooms and parking. The lake itself is just north of the small community of Mineral, which has food, drink and lodging nearby.

Mineral Lake is about 1 hour and 15 minutes southsoutheast of Tower Lanes, Tacoma, and about 7 minutes south of Elbe. A Discover Pass is required, unless you already have a Vehicle Access Pass issued with the purchase of a hunting or fishing license.

Carp - How to Catch a Freight Train - David Paul Williams




