# Let's Have an Outing to ...

During this year, I may have asked you to share your thoughts on where the club might go fishing in the future. As 2024 approaches, I'm again set to prepare a calendar that will please as many members as possible. I' asking for your ideas. I can't guarantee we'll use your idea next year, but I will promise to save it for future consideration. Please message me if you have some suggestions at dfrazier@wavecable.com.

When I look for destinations, I try to take into account the fishing tastes of our diverse group. Some members are more interested in rivers; others in lakes or saltwater. Some want one-day trips; others want get-away waters. Some want weekday outings: others want weekends. Some like tried-and-true destinations; others want new experi-

ences. I could go on, but you get the idea.

Other considerations may include:

Accommodations. Is there a descent campground for multiday trips that has tent sites, RV sites and cabins?

Weather. That's been difficult this vear.

Distance. Is Idaho too far? Seasonality. Will the famous

hatch be on? Are the fish running? Have the waters been stocked recently? Are the waters open for angling?

Rendezvous Point. Is there an easy place to meet up?

Crowding. Can the location handle the size of our group?

Options. Are there other places to fish nearby during multi-day trips?

## **Dash Point Outing**

Dash Point Park & Pier, Tacoma, 6 a.m. Saturday, Sept. 2

Let's hear it for odd-numbered years when the pink salmon arrive in Puget Sound. The 2023 run is expected to be the best since 2013. This year's forecast is for a whopping 4 million pinks! And September is also coho time. Get your coffee on and meet us at the Dash Point Park & Pier when the parking lot gate opens at 6 a.m. This is high tide, but a good time to secure your spot on the beach. The tide will be starting to go out and, with a little help from nature, the fish should be on the move on this sandy-bottomed, north-facing beach. The tide will drop from about 9 feet to 1 foot between 8:30 a.m. and noon. Low tide is at about 1:13 p.m.

Flies: For pinks, the favorite color is pink — HOT pink. Top colors for coho can range from hot pink to chartreuse, purple and black, often with white or light-colored bodies. Patterns include Clouser minnows, sand eels, herring patterns and surface flies such as

gurglers and Leland Miyawaki's Beach Popper.

Gear: Fish can range is size from about 2 to 8 pounds in our region. Hook sizes from 2 to 6 are recommended. Rods of 6-8 weight with floating or intermediate-sinking tips or lines. Bring a stripping basket if you have one. Let's hope the wind hasn't foiled and spoiled the beach with tangling weeds as it did in 2022.

The Rendezvous: Dash Point Park & Pier parking lot, 1500 Beach Dr. NE, Tacoma. Dash Point is about 26 minutes northwest from Tower Lanes in Tacoma.

## **Cowlitz River Outing**

Cowlitz Trout Hatchery (Blue Creek Boat Launch area), Saturday-Monday, Sept. 16-18

September and October can be an exciting time on the Cowlitz. On an ideal day, you can expect to find steelhead, coho and searun cutthroat trout. During this time last year I was into SRCs on size 8 and 10 wet flies that were swung or stripped. Steelhead were seen being taken and there was much talk of the silvers coming through in the vicinity of the Blue Creek Boat Launch where I was fishing. The weather was also warm and just about perfect. But given the unpredictability of forecasting this past year, please don't quote me on any unrealized promises!

I also took advantage of the overlapping runs to pull out both my 4-weight switch rod for the SRCs and my 14-foot 7-weight spey to chuck heavy line into the deeper runs on the far side of the river where I hoped to find one of bigger species. Single-handed rods would also work, but having the ability to get more distance seemed like a good idea. And it's a blast to cast.

If you plan on preparing for fishing for steelies and coho, bring along a stout rod — about an 8-weight for single-handed rods, or a 6- to 7-weight spey. Have a variety of sinking tips to give you more options. If you're focusing some time on the SRCs, 5- or 6-weight rods with floating or slower-sinking lines should suffice. Trout speys of 3- to 5-weight should be about right. Bring a wading staff and cleated boots if you have them.

I have this outing down for three days, but it can easily be a day trip. I'll be trailer camping at Barrier Dam Campgrounds, about 10 minutes upstream from the Blue Creek launch area. From Tower Lanes in Tacoma, it's only about

1.5 hours to the Cowlitz River Blue Creek Boat Launch section, where trails lead downstream to plenty of enticing water. With our 3-day Cowlitz River outing this month, we are happy to host Matt Klaiber the owner of Puget Sound Fly Shop. As with many of us, Matt took to fishing at an early age. It became a big part of his life after 4 years in the Marines when he lived in Spokane. He gained most of his early fly-fishing experience during that time when he and a friend, Jesse, fished in Idaho, Montana, Canada, the Great Lakes and areas in the Midwest for days at a time. Jesse was an excellent flyfisherman and became Matt's mentor. Matt's two tours in the Middle East had taken a mental toll on him and he found peace when fishing. ## Fish Kill

Yes, this is a shocking headline, but unfortunately it is occurring in several of our streams now.

Anglers and Biologists have reported finding dead Coastal Cutthroat Trout, Rainbow Trout, and sculpins in many streams in Western Washington during the month of August. The cause is extremely low stream flows. Some streams are experiencing record low flows this year. Fish are becoming trapped in pools that heat up and die due to water temperatures and lack of oxygen.

If you arrive at your favorite stream and you see it is lower than usual, it is best to think about giving the fish a break right now. Hopefully we will start to see cooler weather and some rainfall that should help improve this situation. We all need to do our part to protect this valuable resource.

One last thing, please check the regulations for rivers and streams in Western Washington. Most close October 31, but not all. Some Hood Canal streams closed August 15 and most others closed August 31. WDFW

enforcement will be watching these streams to protect our salmon runs and it would be unfortunate to be ticketed for fishing in closed waters for lack of knowledge of the regulations.
