Yakima River Outing Monday-Wednesday, March 6-8

We return to the fabulous Yak, Washington's only Blue Ribbon river. I've scheduled this outing around a guide's tip that Skwala stonefly activity can be at its peak around the full moon (March 7). The river level should be low enough for good wading and high enough for smooth drifting. The water is also starting to warm, signaling bugs to burst out and the wild trout to chow down. Take the opportunity to drift Skwala adults and nymphs, small Blue Wing Olives and

midges or swing small olive Sculpzillas on a singled-handed or two-handed trout spey. Although the lower Yak is a known for its drift-boat angling, there is an abundance of walk 'n' wade access.

Meeting up: This may be a challenge, given that so many members have their favorite drifts and preferences for overnight accommodations. The Ellensburg KOA Journey campground

offers tent sites, full hookups and a couple of cabins (the Yakima River RV Park isn't open in March). There are also a half-dozen Kittitas County campgrounds throughout the popular canyon section. Personally, I'll select a cozy Airbnb in Ellensburg! True, part of the fun is exploring. But if you're new to the river, let me know in advance so we can arrange to meet and get you to one of my favorite spots.

Directions: Ellensburg is about two hours from Tower Lanes in Tacoma. The most popular spots along the lower Yakima for launching watercraft and wading access are Ellensburg KOA Journey, Irene Rinehart Riverfront Park, Ringer Loop Road and Bighorn Campground.

The local fly shop is probably closed, so in the morning you will have to drive 25 miles back from your camp at Dry Falls Lake to the fly shop, missing the early morning fishing. As you reach Ephrata, you stop at the Desert Fly Shop to see what time the shop opens in the morning. Wait what? A vending machine located right in front of the store filled with essential fly-fishing goodies! Quickly you select the tippet and some flies selected for the local lakes and you're on your way. Relieved that you can now fish in the morning. Grateful for this option, you wonder what the back story is regarding this vending machine.

Darc Knobel, owner of the **Desert Fly Shop and Guide** service in Ephrata WA, opened the Desert Fly Shop 18 years ago in 2004. Darc envisioned a vending machine in the original business plan. He installed one in 2013. It provides fishing supplies 24 hours a day to customers and during the hours the shop is closed, and when Darc is out guiding some of the fantastic regional fishing. So, when fishing this area, be sure to stop at the Desert Fly Shop, check out the vending machine, visit Darc and the shop's selection of fly angling and tying materials. The President's Award

A Brief History - Steve Saville

As I alluded to in the Leader Line, Dennis Beardsley is the most recent recipient of the award for outstanding service to the club.

It occurred to me that many of our membership may not be aware of the award or how it came about. As I have been researching the club's history, I have come upon several brief passages in newsletters from past years relating to the award.

The President's Award was conceived in 1993 by then President Paul Elsberry. Some of you may remember Paul from years past as an active member for many years. Paul has since moved on to California to be with his children, but he is still in the memory of many. The Award was originally titled the "Al Allard Award," and

was conceived to be a traveling award “to be awarded by the outgoing President each year.”

Somewhere along the way, someone had taken a picture of Al holding a sea run Cutthroat and it was to be presented to Al at an upcoming meeting. Unfortunately, Al passed away in September of 1992, before the picture could be awarded. He was a long time member of the club, filling numerous board positions, including President. Al was known to be an avid fly-fisher as well as a capable mentor. This from the October 1993 club newsletter:

“Paul Elsberry, our President, explained that the picture of Al that we had intended to award him will be retained by the club. It will be awarded by the outgoing President each September to a member that has contributed in some way to the club. For the interim, Paul asked Bob Haskins, who had been supportive of the club and knew Al well, to be the first interim recipient of the President’s Award.”

The President’s Award is now done by the outgoing President in January or February of each year. It should be noted that during the Covid Pandemic when we did not meet in person, the award was not given. The first actual award or original award was given to Vern Young who was at the time, the club’s newsletter editor. Over the years there have been numerous recipients, the latest being Dennis. I know Vern and he was certainly a worthy recipient.

During the year 2017, long time member of forty years, Dick Matthaei passed away after battling lung cancer for many years. Dick had had numerous surgeries during that time but whenever possible, he returned to the club with a smiling face. He was a former President and Treasurer through many of those years. He was a Certified Casting Instructor, mentor, and friend to all who knew him. I had the honor of knowing Dick for many years and his loss weighed heavily on many.

In 2018, it was suggested that we rename the President’s Award honoring Dick and so now the award is known as the Dick Matthaei President’s Award. His picture has replaced that of Al Allard, but Al’s picture, along with a list of yearly recipients and a brief history, is neatly tucked behind the picture of Dick and remains a part of the club’s history. Hopefully the tradition of the President’s award will continue for many years. I view it as an important “perk” of the outgoing President, and I was honored to be able to present it.






