Tim Flagler

In July we welcome Tim Flagler, the owner of Tightline Productions. Tim is a well-known fly tying instructor and video producer. His YouTube videos (practicalpatterns.com) are some of the best in the business, with over 122,000 subscribers and 40 million views. He produces new videos weekly, which are also featured on Midcurrent, Trout Unlimited's website, and in the Orvis Learning Center and blog. In addition, he has a regular column "Beginner's Masterclass with Tim Flagler" in Fly Tyer magazine, which selected Tim as their "Fly Tyer of the Year" in 2022.



Many of Tim's videos delve beyond tying to show what flies look like underwater, what natural it represents and how it can be fished. Tim's a fixture at Fly Fishing Shows and does monthly "Tie-Offs" with Tom Rosenbauer (Orvis) and Cheech Pierce (Fly Fish Food). He enjoys guiding year round for South Branch Outfitters (formerly Shannon's Fly & Tackle) in Califon, NJ and hosts annual trips to Patagonia in the spring and to the Kootenai River in MT and Northern British Columbia in the summer.

Tim's presentation will be "What Trout Like to Eat & Flies to Feed Them". As one of Tim's most popular topics, this recently updated video-based presentation includes incredible underwater footage of a variety of aquatic insects, bait fish and crustaceans that trout eat. In addition, Tim will share the fly patterns we use to best imitate the variety of bugs discussed. Instructions on how to tie the patterns shared in this presentation can be found on Tim's YouTube channel.

Walk and Wade Outing – North Fork Skokomish River

Want to enjoy a beautiful river, nature and hopefully a few fish in our local National Park?

Join me on **Monday July 14th at 8:30 AM** at the Staircase Campground bridge.

The North Fork of the Skokomish is a beautiful, clear, clean and cold river. There are Cutthroat Trout and I have heard there may be Dolly Varden present. All species are catch and release on single-pointed barbless hooks.

There is easy river access right from the campground. Also, if you follow the Rapid Loop Trail, you can access the river by some side trails and way points. The rocks in the water are really slick, so be careful, wear appropriate wading boots and bring your wading staff! I will probably not wear wadersjust wading boots and socks unless it's raining. But the water is really cold, so be prepared! A 4 or 5 weight rod will work well. I have caught fish nymphing, but bring dry flies too.

I plan on meeting folks on the bridge next to parking at the campground between 8:30 and

9 AM to offer directions to river points if you've never been there. There is a beautiful loop trail that follows the river and is well worth the walk! Staircase Area Brochure- Olympic National Park

The access to the North Fork for this outing is located in the Olympic National Park from the Staircase Campground. Basically, drive to Hoodsport on the Hood Canal and turn on WA-119/Lake Cushman road. Follow until the end (about 15 miles) and you will get to the park entrance booth. There is a fee to enter the park, and the cost varies by pass type. The America the Beautiful pass, Annual pass, Senior pass and Vereran/Military will get your vehicle in. If the booth is closed, display your pass on your dash. If you don't have a pass, you can pay that day fee (\$15-30; no cash). More info about the Park fees HERE.

There is no cell service in the Park.


NW Youth Conservation and Fly Fishing Academy


