

Can You Say Hexagenia limbata?

Merrill Lake, Friday-Sunday, July 14-16

The world's largest mayfly brings in a lake's biggest fish. At Merrill Lake, that can mean brown trout weighing several pounds, as well as native cutthroat and some rainbows, including triploids. When the Hex hatch is on — traditionally six to eight weeks from July through August — things can get downright insane from just before sunset and well into the night.

When fishing at night, use a head lamp, 3X tippets and shorter leaders to avoid tangles and break-offs. When you think you've heard a splash near your fly, avoid setting the hook; wait for the the fish to latch on and pull. Trout are known to drown the big bugs before biting them.

During daylight hours, when you're not tying on the usual summer fly patterns (calibaetis, caddis, beetles, ants, chironomids, water boatmen, BWOs, leeches, blah-blah-blah), you can hang a huge size 6 Hex cripple on the surface or drop a huge Hex nymph along a silty bottom about 10 to 40 feet down. Hex mayflies can be up to 13/8 inches long, not counting their tails.

Merrill Lake was formed when lava flows from Mt. St. Helens blocked the stream valley. Fishing can be good all over this 283-acre lake, but many Hexperts swear by the north end.

This is a year-round catch and release lake. Fly-fishing only. No barbs, no split shot, no gas motors. Bring your Discover Pass. Headlamps are essential for the sunset bite, as well as the ability to find your way back to your put-in spot. Bring 4-6-weight rods with floating, intermediate and sinking lines.

We'll be trailering to Cougar RV Park & Campground, site 18, in Cougar, which also has tent sites and cabins. Call (360) 238-5224 for availability. Merrill is only 15 minutes from Cougar. Merrill Lake is in Cowlitz County, about 2.5 hours from Tower Lanes in Tacoma.

Leech Lake Report

This was an all-weather outing if you were with us for more than Saturday. Rain, wind and sun was with us at various times on Thursday and Friday. The better weekend days had some wind (and a lot of other anglers). The parking lot was overflowing, as was the launch site. But the fish were there, too. Brookies, of course, up to about 12 inches, and triploid rainbows up to 18 inches.

Lots of flies seemed to work at some time or another. I had good days using my Koosh Bop,

which is a Bop (boobie and mop combo) that uses a rubbery tail made from a Koosh toy. Another crazy eye-opener for me was the Fab fly, a brightly colored and lightly floating version of the Blob fly. The difference the Fab uses a tab of foam off the end of the fly instead of a bead. Both patterns use Jelly Fritz and were fished floating off the bottom using an intermediate line. Damselfly nymphs also worked well.

While a couple of our members stayed to fish on Saturday only, those that were around for dinner on Saturday were fed BBQ pulled-pork sandwiches, coleslaw and cookies. Thanks for attending: Ryan Puddy, Tom Krughoff, Jim Baker, Julie Kelner, Rick McCabe, Dennis Ehlers and (too briefly) Ron McNeal.

Ohop Lake Report

Rain, showers and searching for the big bite. That was my first experience at Ohop Lake. While there were some limited hits and landings of spiny rays and trout Saturday morning, the overall impression was of casting practice under dampening skies.

Having said that, I still feel giving Ohop more time to redeem itself is in my future. It sure does look bassy.

Tom Krughoff expertly pivoted from searching for trout and bass and found success focusing on the lake's bluegill population, returning home with a healthy batch for a fish fry.

I spoke with a couple of returning bass fishermen who reported boating five nice largemouth at the far end of this long, narrow lake, where a small tournament was apparently finding success. These guys had arrived at the lake at 5:30 a.m. to find the parking lot loaded with boat trailers. And I thought getting there at 7 a.m. was early!

Studies have shown that rain and a lowering barometer tends to send bass into shallow water for dining opportunities. So ... I can see the advantage of having a motorboat when searching for hot spots spread over a large impoundment.
