My memories of Robert Gerlach by Michael Merringer

We met earlier this month and learned about the passing of one of our members, Robert Gerlach.

Steve Jones from the Washington Chapter of Fly Fishers International (FFI) was there to announce that they were naming an award after him. It would be given to people who had dedicated their time and talents to helping others. Robert's family was also there, and two of his sons expressed their gratitude and how much this meant to their dad.

Unfortunately, Robert passed away a couple of days before the meeting. I was especially sad because I knew how much he appreciated this gesture and how honored he was for this recognition. Many of the people at the meeting knew Robert and had a long history with him; mine only started five years ago.

I wanted to get a Casting Instructor (CI) certification from FFI, so I found Robert's contact information. He was listed as a gifted fly rod caster who had gotten his CI certification a number of years ago.

One of Robert's favorite stories about his CI test was that he put his yam on the tape at 75 feet, not only meeting the distance limit but literally, on the tape. I asked if he would be willing to be my mentor, and to my surprise, he agreed. We decided to meet at Gold Mountain Golf Course, where he was pursuing his other passion.

Over the next five years, we had lots of chances to talk, floating the Yakima, long rides back and forth to casting events and shows, and sharing many meals together. As it turned out, we were a great match.

He loved telling me about his life, and I was a good listener.

At that meeting at Gold Mountain, I first heard him say, "You can always tell a German, but you can't tell him much," about his heritage and personality. He had always tried to be perfect in cabinet making, fly rod casting, and his golf swing.

He also mentioned that I could help him with his volunteer work with the youth at the Northwest Fly Fishing Academy. He had spent countless hours teaching them how to cast

Robert had lived a full life. He told me about making floating display cases for a famous jeweler on the West Coast, riding Harleys, and his time at Sturgis, South Dakota, and camping in his RV that looked like a semi-truck. He also talked about all the fishing trips he had taken. Robert was incredibly proud of his three sons and grandson and often talked about their achievements. It was clear that family was the most important thing to him.

Even though he was small in stature, Robert was larger than life. You always knew he was in the room, and he wasn't afraid to share his thoughts and opinions. What started as a mentorship turned into a friendship, but he never held back when it came to my casting. I'll never forget some of his comments, like telling me my loops were "big enough to drive a semi-truck through and maybe, most importantly, 'slow the **** down." Maybe we should all take that advice, no matter what we're doing.

I'll miss my friend a lot.

MAP


I am a rookie at fishing for salmon from the beach, however here are a few basics I have learned. Anyone who has experience, please post helpful tips in the forum.

- 6-8 weight rod (8 would be best in case you hook up a big one)
- Intermediate or outbound short line, 8 to 10 pound tippet. Some folks use a floating line if you want your fly on the surface
- Pinks prefer bright colors, of course pink, and chartreuse works well. To name a few: pink and white clouser minnows, pink comet, flashabou, beach boy and handle bar (?) Ask for recommendations at your local fly shop or a PSFF member. Most common size hook is #6.
- When fishing for salmon in Washington you must use single pointed barbless hooks.
- According to the WDFW fishing regs the daily limit is 2 (if you choose to keep fish) plus 2. This can change, we can check the emergency rule change post the morning of the outing to confirm.

I'm looking forward to this fishing adventure, please let me know if you will be attending!

The forum offers current information for users on what to fish, where, and which patterns are hitting. Use the forum to post events, share resources, ask questions and organize outings around the area.


