# Outings Lenice Is Calling

As one of the premiere desert lakes in Washington, Lenice also can be one of the most popular — especially in the spring. We may not be the only fly-fishing club sharing the 93-acre jewel. But the prospects of latching onto

when the fishing turns on. Selective gear rules in effect.

Based on past stocking numbers, we can expect a fresh batch of around 7,000 trout in addition to the numerous holdovers.

LENICE LAKE

The shorelines are shallow enough to provide outstanding sight fishing. Portable watercraft are in common use, but be prepared to haul your rig on a mostly flat quarter-mile trail from the parking area to the water.

a fair number of round-shouldered rainbows are very good.

Lenice Lake is located east of the small town of Beverly in Grant County, 19 minutes southeast of Vantage and the Columbia River crossing on I-90. This productive lake produces large trout. Like many desert lakes, it can get windy and cold after ice-out,

During our time there in March, chironomids and streamer patterns are king, so bring your bobbers. The lake — which is considered one of the region's seep lakes — is fairly shallow, mostly 10-15 feet, with one area up to 20 feet.

Directions: Lenice Lake is within 3 hours from Tower Lanes, via I-90. Once across the Columbia River bridge at Vantage, turn right (south) on Highway 26 and transition onto Highway 243. At the town of Beverly, turn left onto Lower Crab Creek Road. In 4.2 miles, you'll see the lake's parking area on the left.

Camping: Tent and dry-camping for trailers is permitted. There is also a campground for tents and trailers (and one 3-room house) called Vantage Riverstone in Vantage, about 20 minutes from Lenice. Call (509) 856-2800 for more information. There is also Sand Hollow Campground, 11094 WA-243, north of Beverly, that is 5 minutes from Vantage. It has dry camping for tents and small trailers. Call (509) 754-5088 ext. 3181.



Join us in tying these patterns at Tower Lanes on Saturday, March 23, 9:30 a.m.








